

The St. Louis U. High Cross Country team opened the 2006 season last Friday at McNair Park. SLUH took home second place in the varsity division and a good feeling about the season to come.

The racing squad left school after sixth period so they would have time to drive out to St. Charles and still have time to warm up for the 4:30 race. The weather for the meet was uncharacteristically nice with temperatures in the mid 70s and nice cloud cover.

SLUH's pack started the race in good position, sticking together through mile one. Matt Lawder came through the mile in 5:12 followed closely by the rest of the pack at 5:20.

Lawder would finish the race as the team's number one man and in second place overall with a 16:22. Junior Mike McCafferty was SLUH's number two man. In his first ever varsity race he had a huge

performance, running 16:55 for first place, hisy stuck together until the two mile mark a personal record by over a minute.

"I was a little nervous before the race and had trouble concentrating at school on Friday," McCafferty stated after the race, "but I was also really excited. ... I knew I just needed to stay on pace. The magic number (for breaking 17 minutes) was to (have a two mile) split at 10:50." McCafferty came through mile two right on pace at 10:50. In the last mile, recalled McCafferty, "I started passing all these runners that I had heard of before and knew were good. So I knew I was going fast."

SLUH wanted the two through seven runners to stay in a pack for the beginning of the race and then try to place in the last mile. The pack stuck together for the first mile and then began to separate when sophomore David Kuciejczyk-Kernan surged in mile two. Kuciejczyk-Kernan dropped back in mile three, but held on for 24th place overall and sixth on varsity.

Nate Banet and sophomore John Clo-

hisy stuck together until the two mile mark when Banet quickened the pace and moved into the third position for SLUH's team. Banet finshed in 14th place running a 17:04, with Clohisy on his heels in 17:16 and 21st place.

Dan Viox rounded out SLUH's scoring five by moving up in mile three to take 23rd place in 17:20. Junior Chris Murphy had a rough day, but hung together for a time of 18:05.

All of SLUH's scoring five ran personal bests for the opening meet, showing great improvement from how they finished last year. But while SLUH ran great, they fell short of the team title (won by last year's state champs Fort Zumwalt South) and took second place. But it was a solid second place and the team hopes to build off of it this weekend when they race in the First Annual Forest Park Cross Country Festival hosted by SLUH. The race will be Saturday at 9:00 a.m. Be there to see what will probably be St. Louis's biggest meet of the year.
