The hand-held torch was then lit, and four executives of McDonnell Douglas and four special athletes ran a relay around the main field carrying the flame to light the large, ceremonial torch and officially open the Special Olympics.

Bruce Hayward, Master of Ceremonies, first introduced the thirteen institutions which sponsored athletes at the games and then the three high school teams (DuBourg, Aquinas Mercy, and SLUH) and one select team (White Star) that would instruct the athletes in soccer.

Each soccer player instructed about three special athletes. For SLUH, Steve Kuntz and Craig Holke showed the competitors how to shoot the ball between two cones. Seniors Steve O'Brien and Matt Jermak and junior John Eisele enjoyed teaching kids to dribble around obstacles. Tim Green, John Barfield, Jason Steuber, and Steamer John Bain let the competitors practice throw-

ins, while Dave Kostecki, Bill Tierney, coach Dunn, and Steamer Albert Adade drilled the athletes on taking shots at a goal. Volleying, passing, and heading the ball were skills that senior John Pini, sophomore Brian Leahy, and coach Dan Gaffney taught.

When the day was over, the Soccerbills came away with mementos—a cap, T—shirt, and two posters—but much more importantly, they came away with memories.

Senior Dave Kostecki accurately summed up his sentiments by saying "the event was not only a tremendous learning experience, but it was also a great time. I was a little concerned at the beginning about how to react to the kids. But I found that if I treated them like any other kids. I was able to relax and really enjoy myself."

Mr. Dunn said. "These kids are so pleasantly responsive and appreciative of the help you give them. For me, it is one of the most meaningful things I have done in soccer."

September 10, 1988 has been set side for this event. Mr. Dunn has already agreed to help, and looks forward to returning next year.
