Gridbills' Defense Flusters Bulldogs' Running Attack

Touted as one of the most significant games of the year in terms of playoff outcomes, the Junior Bills (8-1) faced off against the Bulldogs of Sumner for the first time since the early '70's last Friday night, defeating the Bulldogs 10-8.

As a result of this victory and other related games, the Bills are one of the few teams to have already won their district. Two weeks ago the Gridbills and Sumner crushed their respective district opponents Beaumont and Roosevelt. Last week Beaumont defeated SLUH's only remaining district opponent, Roosevelt. With SLUH's triumph over seventh ranked contender Sumner, the Bills secured a playoff spot.

The Footbills, facing a much larger opponent, controlled the ball on both sides for the entire game. Although unable to generate the oft seen turnovers against the Bulldogs as a result of Sumner's groundbased style of play, the defense once again came through where needed. The SLUH "D" line consisting of ends Jim DeVoto and Kevin Roy, tackles Tim Haberburger and Jeff Bell, and nose tackle Tom Shaner combined for 18 solo tackles and 20 assists. This performance effectively shut down the powerful Sumner offense allowing the SLUH offense to give the loyal fans a good show.

The first quarter gave many Jr. Bills a Halloween fright, however. No, not because of the superfans adorned with pumpkins, but because of the performance of the stellar Bulldog defense on the first SLUH drive. However, after yielding up the ball to the Bulldogs, the Jr. Bill defense showed some muscle of its own, forcing a punt from the Sumner offensive squad. 

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plays later, including a 65 yard reception by senior Tim Cuneo, handily worked their way down to the Sumner 2 yard line. At 5:35 of the first quarter, senior quarterback John McArthur was able to force his way into the endzone on the very next play giving the Bills a 7-0 lead. Sumner, still unable to advance, allowed the Bills to control the ball through the end of the quarter.

Although a substantial segment of both teams offense occurred during the second quarter, neither team was able to produce a touchdown as a result of timely defense for the two squads. After an intercepted pass ended the Bills' first drive, Sumner was able to advance to inside the Gridbills' ten yard line. However, one of the two incredible goal line stands by the Footbills that evening prevented the Bulldogs from coming within striking range.

The Bills, late in the half, were able to post their final points of the game. After a personal foul by Sumner allowed the Bills to continue their drive, a McArthur pass to senior David Ries advanced the ball to near the goal line. Sumner's size advantage prevented a McArthur replay and forced the Jr. Bills back to the six. Several incomplete passes later, the Bills place kicker Chris Calsyn punched the ball through the uprights giving the Bills a ten-point advantage over their discouraged opponents. Ries's 39-yard reception and run proved to be one of the most exciting plays the offense created all game. "What a great play," stated one SLUH fan; "Ries must have bounced off and spun around at least five defenders."

With a decent lead, the Bills were able to concentrate on defense the second half—and concentrate they did. Sumner had the first possession of the half, but they promptly yielded up the ball to SLUH. The Jr. Bills, unable to generate anything offensively, returned the ball to Sumner. Similarly Sumner failed to generate any offense. They did, however, succeed to fake a punt. From SLUH's 20 yard line, the Bulldogs slowly forced their way to SLUH's one-yard line. Confident that on 4 and goal their size would allow them to force their way into the endzone, they ran right up the middle. However, senior Paul Herzberg, who totalled an amazing 8 solo tackles for the game, had plans of his own. Herzberg pounded the hapless Bulldog, preventing what could have been a disastrous blow to the Jr. Billiken cause.

Sumner's offensive spurt continued into their next drive, in which they advanced to SLUH's seven before being deflated by the SLUH defense.

The Bulldogs finally were able to slip in a touchdown with only 1:42 left in the game. A fumble by SLUH's offense on its own 30 yard line allowed the Bulldogs to again advance to the SLUH one yard line. On fourth down, the Bills were hoping that they could again smash the Bulldogs' efforts. But Michael Ware was able to sneak past the Jr. Bill defenders to finally light up the scoreboard for Sumner. In a last ditch effort to save the game, the Bulldogs attempted a two-point conversion, which succeeded, followed by an onside kick, which did not. With just over a minute remaining in the game and a two point lead backing them up, the Jr. Bills played it safe and let the clock do their work for them.

Head coach Gary Kornfeld was ecstatic with his team's performance. He felt that they did exceptionally well controlling the ball against a larger opponent. He was particularly pleased with the way his team played inside its own ten-yard line.

The Bills, now ranked fourth in the area and ninth in the state by the *Post-Dispatch*, will play their final regular season game against the Rough Riders of Roosevelt tonight at Roosevelt.

Next Wednesday, the Bills may well play the winner of tonight's match-up between unranked CBC and #1 Hazelwood East in the sectional contest.
