

Varsity Footballs anticipate district playoffs after defeating tough Granite City Warriors

The Jr. Bill Varsity football team traveled to Granite City last week and returned with a 22-14 victory to raise its impressive record to 6-1 and earn SLUH a #3 ranking in the *St. Louis Post Dispatch* poll.

Senior Ed Hurley helped the Grid-bills spoil Granite City's homecoming by turning in an incredible rushing performance of 237 yards on 20 carries. Hurley, who broke the SLUH single game rushing record with his outstanding offensive effort, again attributed much of his success to the play of the offensive line.

Last week's victory marked Hurley's third game of over 200 yards rushing this season and raised his season rushing total

to 870 yards, an average of 7.9 yards per carry. Commented Hurley, "It was fun running for 237 yards."

The SLUH defense began the game with intensity as they shut down the Warrior offense on the first series and forced a punt. Hurley capitalized on Brian Holley's 25 yard punt return with several key runs to set up a 40 yard field goal attempt. The kick failed, however, and Granite City answered with an 80 yard scoring drive to end the first quarter 7-0.

The second quarter began with failed offensive drives for both teams. A determined Jr. Bill offense then put SLUH on the scoreboard when a 51 yard run by

Soccerbills rebound with victory, tie after McCluer loss

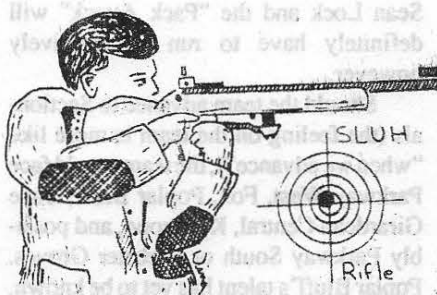

However, the Bills balanced their attack and played together in a very respectable win over Sedalia-Smith Cotten and a tie to the sixth ranked Tigers of Oakville High School on Tuesday.

The Bills expected an easy opponent in McCluer. However, the Comets proved to be a valid opponent and upset the eighth ranked Bills 1-0. SLUH had trouble producing scoring opportunities throughout the first half, but the defense prohibited McCluer from scoring most of the half. However, with 18 minutes remaining in the first half, a SLUH defender tripped a Comet for-

standings, published this month.

The Jr. Bill squad placed sixth in the 4-position competition. Seniors Dan Schoenekase and Shawn Spindel, and juniors Geoff Bull and Kurt Siebel-Spath racked up 1499 out of a possible 1600

points to gain their national ranking. The squad was just 24 points away from first-ranked Superior High School in Superior, Wisconsin.

In the more difficult 3-position shooting, Schoenekase, Spindel, and Bull placed eleventh nationally.

This year the team will return to Highland, Illinois, to compete in sectionals and hopefully shoot well enough to place first in the nation. At last year's sectionals, the team took the state championship, and placed first in both the 3 and 4 position sectionals.

Shawn Spindel, when asked about how the season will go, said, "I think we'll be much better because we still have our top shooters and a lot of depth for the rest of the team - plus all of us have improved." The team will open their season December 12 in a tri-match against CBC and Country Day.

The Harriers have beaten all these teams (except Parkway West) but have also been beaten by Kirkwood and Parkway South. "Neither team beat us when we were on, though," commented Linhares. The District takes the top four finishing teams to advance to the Sectionals. The Harriers feel that a second place finish isn't out of reach. Sean Lock and the "Pack Attack" will definitely have to run competitively however.

Should the team advance to Sectionals (the feeling on the team is more like "when we advance"), the team would face Parkway West, Fox, Poplar Bluff, Cape Girardeau Central, Kirkwood, and possibly Parkway South or Webster Groves. Poplar Bluff's talent has yet to be known. "We won't take anything for granted; they could have a very tough team," stated Linhares. Cape Girardeau Central is also somewhat of a mystery. The Harriers saw some of Cape Central's team run in the J.V. race at the Hancock Invitational earlier this season. "Cape Central is a very talented team, but we haven't quite seen

what they can do at the Varsity level," Linhares continued.

Ultimately, the team's destiny is in its own hands (although a prayer for good weather from Brian Hayes would definitely help).

The B-Harriers ran Monday in the Tiger Classic on the campus of SIU-E. The sophomores took first and were led by Gene Marshall who ran 18:48 (5th) and Tim Probst who placed 10th in 19:37. The B-Bills looked "impressive," placing their top 5 in the top 20 said Linhares.

The Lil' bills ran in the Hazelwood Freshman Invitational Wednesday, taking 10th place out of 22 teams. Ray Griner capped an impressive year, placing 14th overall with a time of 20:32. Tim Rooney and Dan Cornell finished 53 and 65 in 22:52 and 23:24. The C-team was not quite as fast as the freshman in the past, but with hard work and more experience, they have the potential to be very good.

The self-proclaimed "number one J.V. team in the nation," along with the B and C Harriers will finish their seasons next Tuesday at the Lindbergh Invitational, completing very fine seasons.

Coach Linhares hopes to see one last "first place" trophy from the seniors and the rest of his team.
